About the ICPE Report Card

The ICPE Report Card rated incumbents who filed for reelection in 2020, grading them based on their votes on nine bills that either:

- promoted the expansion of private school vouchers
- · increased tax credits giving taxpayer money to scholarships for private schools
- · cut voter control of public education, or
- supported or harmed public education.

The ICPE Report Card was created by the Indiana Coalition of Public Education (ICPE), a bi-partisan non-profit organization that supports public schools. ICPE's legislative priorities are available on the organization's website.

In all, ICPE issued grades to 115 legislators. Thirty incumbent members of the Indiana General Assembly running for reelection earned A's, five earned a B. six earned C's. 71 earned D's and none earned F's for their support for Indiana's public schools. Three earned an incomplete grade for voting on too few of the nine bills to calculate.

In ICPE's view, when you weaken public schools by diverting funding away from them, you undermine a key institution in our society - one that stands as the bedrock of democracy and the cornerstone of local communities.

Since ICPE primarily focuses on issues relating to privatizing public schools, the organization based its report card on nine bills in the 2019 and 2020 legislative sessions that diverted taxpayers' money away from public schools, damaged public control of

education, or either supported or harmed public education.

Two bills in particular in the 2020 session, House Bill 1002 and Senate Bill 2, had unanimous bi-partisan support. HB 1002 eliminates the requirement to use standardized test scores for teacher evaluations and SB 2 holds

schools and school districts harmless from scores from the new ILEARN test. affecting how the state will designate performance measures for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 school years.

"Legislators on both sides of the aisle deserve our thanks for their votes on these two bills," said Cathy Fuentes-Rohwer, ICPE President. "We're pleased to see legislators acknowledge that students and schools need time to adjust when a new standardized test is adopted, and that there are other more relevant ways to evaluate teachers. These votes show it is possible to find common ground."

ICPE urges voters who value public education to use the information in this legislative report card as they decide how to vote in November. If you do not know which legislative district you live in, you can find that information at IndianaVoters.com.

In the most recent budget year, vouchers divert over \$172.8 million from public schools to private schools annually — up nearly \$20 million in the past two years. Indiana's cumulative spending for vouchers now exceeds \$1 billion. Despite the original premise for Indi-

ana's voucher program to allow underprivileged students from underachieving public schools the opportunity to attend a private school, over half of all vouchers (60%) now go to students who never attended public schools and have always attended private schools. This fact means a good portion of the \$172.8 million

diverted to private schools last year is an extra fiscal cost to taxpayers for students who never started at public schools and whose private education previously was not the responsibility of taxpayers.

In the face of this national pandemic and impending financial crisis, we hope that voters will bear in mind how essential our public schools are to the health and well-being of, not just our children, but that of our communities. The governor and legislature must lean in and fully fund our public schools. We know that the cost of bringing children and staff back in person is greater than it was before. Outsourced charter and private schools do not serve all children, do not play by the same rules, and do not have the same transparency for budget nor enrollment that public schools have. In the nationwide politicization of school reentry, children's interests are getting lost. It is time for our elected officials to show us that they truly are accountable to our children and their future by supporting public schools - defend, don't defund them.



DIGEST OF BILLS USED FOR THE ICPE 2020 LEGISLATIVE REPORT CARD

2019 Legislative Session

HB-1001 (ICPE OPPOSED)

Known as the budget bill, this bill included a 2.5% increase (on average) for public schools. ICPE favored a 3% increase. The bill raised the cap for tax credits by \$3.5 million over two years for donations to Scholarship Granting Organizations (SGO), which ICPE opposed. An "automatic escalator" for SGOs (ICPE opposed) was removed from the final bill. The bill included additional money (\$15 million over two years) for the Charter Schools Grant and additional money for vouchers. The bill expanded voucher eligibility by adding a 70% voucher, adding two-year new costs of \$19 million, according to the LSA estimate.

One point was given for a no vote on this bill.

HB-1003 (ICPE OPPOSED)

This bill included school corporation expenditure targets and the Governor's plan for teacher pay. ICPE opposed this bill because other bills contained higher amounts for teacher pay.

One point was given for a no vote on this bill.

HB-1005 (ICPE OPPOSED)

This bill set an earlier date for abolishing the elected office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The appointment of the secretary of education by the governor will now begin January 11, 2021. (The previous date was January 11, 2025.) It retained the eligibility language ICPE strongly opposed, which allows a leader with no K-12 experience to be appointed.

One point was given for a no vote on this bill.

HB-1629 (ICPE OPPOSED)

This bill covered various education matters, including expanding voucher eligibility by changing the definition of elementary school. One point was given for a no vote on this bill.

HB-1641 (ICPE OPPOSED)

This bill covered a variety of charter school matters. ICPE opposed this bill due to provisions regarding the sale of no longer used public school buildings. The bill:

- Reduces the time frame that a school corporation must make a vacant or unused school buildings available to a charter school
- Requires a school corporation to sell certain vacant school buildings to an accredited nonpublic school or postsecondary educational institution for an amount not more than the minimum bid for the school building or an amount agreed to by both parties
- Provides that, if a school corporation does not comply with the requirements regarding a vacant or unused school building and charter schools, the school corporation must submit any proceeds from the sale of the vacant or unused school building to the state board of education (state board) to provide grants under the charter school and innovation grant program

One point was given for a no vote on this bill.

2020 Legislative Session

HB-1002 (ICPE SUPPORTED)

This bill eliminates the requirement to use standardized test scores for teacher evaluations.

One point was given for a yes vote on this bill.

HB-1007 Teacher pay amendments (ICPE SUPPORTED THE AMENDMENTS)

Although ICPE did not take a position on the final version of this "fiscal matters" bill, we did support two teacher pay amendments to HB 1007; the votes on the amendments were the votes we counted for the legislative report card. Amendment 14 in the House would have added \$186 million to school funding, with the recommendation that it be used for teacher pay. Amendment 14 also called for at least 10% of all non-public schools receiving money for choice scholarships (vouchers) to be audited each state fiscal year. This was the only attempt at creating more transparency and accountability for schools accepting state funds in this session. Amendment 3 in the Senate tried to add \$100 million in funding to boost teacher pay. Both amendments failed.

HB-1065 (ICPE OPPOSED)

This bill says public schools "may" share referendum proceeds with charter schools, allowing charter schools to pressure public schools to either share referendum proceeds or face their active opposition to the referendum.

One point was given for a no vote on this bill.

SB-2 (ICPE SUPPORTED)

This bill holds schools and school districts harmless from scores from the new ILEARN test, defining how the state will designate performance measures for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 school years.

One point was given for a yes vote on this bill.



Appendix to the ICPE Legislative Report Card 2020

Methodology for assigning grades:

A vote of "no" on six of the nine bills used in this report card was considered a vote in support of public education and given one point per bill. A vote of "yes" on two of the nine bills and either of the two amendments to HB-1007 in 2020 was considered a vote in support of public education and given one point per bill or amendment. The summary of the nine bills in the Legislative Report Card states how points were assigned to each bill.

Grades were assigned on the number of points on the following scale:

	If a legislator voted on all nine bills	If a legislator voted on 6-8 of the nine bills*
A =	8-9 points	7-8 points
B =	6-7 points	5-6 points
C =	4-5 points	3-4 points
D =	2-3 points	1-2 points
F =	0-1 points	0 points

NV = General Assembly member did not vote on that bill

E = Excused absence.

1 = Earned one point for voting in favor of the public schools' position
